Reading

The children have made amazing progress with their reading. Please continue to share fiction and nonfiction books with the children. The children will have individual targets in their reading records, please help them work on these at home as well school.

Writing

I hope the children shared their writing with you at the work share evening. As you can see, they have come on leaps and bounds. Please continue to encourage the children to write at home, they will use their phonic knowledge to spell words and should be praised for having a go. Remember writing does not always mean sitting at a desk, they can write lists, recipes, make tickets, label things etc.

<u>Maths</u>

It has been great to see the children not only recognising/ordering numbers but also starting to understand and apply them in different contexts and to solve problems. Next term we will start with consolidating our numbers to TEN and start to identify odd and even numbers. The children will also be introduced to 3D shapes, starting with the cylinder, and learning about the properties... I am a cylinder, I have one curved face, two curved edges and two circle flat faces. The children will be looking for cylinders in their environment. We will also revisit repeating patterns and further exploring symmetry. The children will also be learning to estimate and say how many object there are a group up to 10/15.

We will continue with our snack shop encouraging the children to pay for their snack using 1p, 2p, 5p and 10p coins. Also to start comparing different values identifying things that are worth more/less.

<u>Topic</u>

We will be revisiting previous learning about seasons Autumn and Winter comparing changes in the environment. We will introduce the first signs of Spring and go for a Spring walk to observe, compare, and discuss changes in the environment. We will also be using our Mind Up skills, thinking about Mindful Seeing and Listening.

Monet

We have had such a busy, fun and creative half term and it was lovely to see lots of parents yesterday celebrating everything that the children in Monet class have achieved.

After half term we will start off our week with recounts and recapping basic punctuation (capital letters, full stops, finger spaces and exclamation marks) followed by writing factual sentences linked to our learning in science and geography.

In maths Year 1 will be combining groups of 10s and 1s, looking at what each digit represents and comparing two numbers less than 100. In Year 2 will be comparing 2-digit numbers and finding half, quarter and a third of amounts.

In science we will be identifying plants and animals in their habitats, focusing on chalk streams and observing our trout. In geography we will be thinking about the differences between a town and the countryside by talking about our own experiences and using the internet to research. In computing we will be using the Scratch app to begin to program a character and understand the need for exact instructions. In DT we will be researching weaving and planning our own weaving project and our RE focus this half term will be 'special stories' beginning with the stories that are special to us and giving reasons why.

Hockney

What a busy week we have had in Hockney class! The children all worked so hard to do their very best in their assessments and we are really pleased with the progress they are making. Keep it up Hockney! As a bit of a treat for trying so hard and really pushing themselves in their assessments we spent Thursday and Friday of this week making our Anglo-Saxon clay pots. Hopefully many of you were able to see these during our work-share evening on Thursday. We then spent Friday having a computing day and developing our skills on scratch before being able to share our expertise and teach others.

Next term promises to be just as busy. We will start the term by diving into a short study of poetry in our English lessons. We will be focusing on performance poetry looking at Roger McGough and how his use of different poetic devices such as onomatopoeia and personification add to his poems and make them more powerful for the reader or listener. By the end of the week, we will be writing our own poems based upon his poem 'The Sound Collector'.

In maths, we shall be focusing on fractions of shape and of number. The Year 4s will then relate this to decimals and understand how to interchange between fractions and decimals. We will then begin to look at equivalent fractions. As we often discuss in class, fractions are one of those areas in maths that become much easier if we have a solid understanding of our times tables. As we shall not be setting any homework over the half term break, please do practise times tables up to X12 with your child as this will really help them with their fractions work when we return to school.

After the half term break we have lots of exciting things to look forward to. The Year 3s will swap with the Year 4s and they will attend forest school on a Monday afternoon whilst the Year 4s have their Anglo-Saxon topic lessons with Mrs Whittingham. Please remember that the children must come to school wearing their school uniform on top and wearing warm

leggings or trousers with a waterproof coat and sturdy footwear that you do not mind getting dirty.

In the first week back after half term we have World Book Day to look forward to which we will celebrate on the Friday of that week. Please do use half term to think really carefully about the character you might like to dress up as. What book are you reading at the moment? Could you come dressed as a character from the novel you are reading? Due to World Book Day falling on a Friday the French horn lessons for all Year 3 and for those individual learners have been moved to Wednesday morning.

As it is half term we shall not be setting any homework. Please do keep up with your reading and don't forget to use Doodle maths and English if you can.

We hope you have a really enjoyable and restful half term break ready to return to what promises to be an exciting and busy term.

Hepworth

It's been a busy week in Hepworth, working around assessments whilst also giving the children opportunities to learn in a relaxing way. To this end, the children painted their Maya pots, and researched crops that the Maya cultivated, which will progress onto making Maya style food after half term. They also had time for light touch revision in Maths and spelling, as well as swimming, PE, Spanish (giving directions), PHSE and Science.

Some of the children also represented the school in Football, with matches for both the Boys and Girls teams in which the children did amazingly well (despite the weather).

English

After the half term holiday children will begin their study of a non-fiction book called 'Animals on the Move' and by the end of the unit they will use what they learn to create a fact file. For the first week, they will be doing some comprehension of the text and focussing on the difference between fact and opinion. Our writing booster and SPAG session includes some focussed work on speech punctuation and including dialogue in our writing.

Maths

Pupils will continue working on shapes as well as looking at ratio and scale to make numbers bigger or smaller, whilst keeping them in proportion – a very useful skill when following recipes! Towards the end of the week they will also look further at 3D shapes.

Other subjects

As mentioned above, in Topic children will be having a go at making their own Maya foods. In Science we will write up the results from our rust investigation which we didn't manage to do at the end of half term due to the wind day! We then begin our new topic - inheritance and evolution. We also have our World Book Day celebration on Friday (please note, this is not the same day as the 'national' day due to Monet class being out on that day. We will be doing some whole-school activities.

Finally, after school Netball club will be re-starting on the Monday after half term, and children will continue with swimming on Wednesdays, so please remember to send your children in with the appropriate clothing.

We hope you manage to survive the windy weather!
